# What is Brataualung Forest Park?

Signs have gone up recently along Budgeree Rd near and at English's Corner (where Budgeree Rd meets Grand Ridge Rd) announcing that the area is now part of the Brataualung Forest Park. I was curious know what this was about.

Brataualung Forest Park is a new conservation reserve, that was launched on 14 July 2018. The name recognises that the reserve area is part of Brataualung Country of the Gunaikurnai people.

## What is Brataualung Forrest


Back in 2008 The Strzelecki Reserve (Cores and Links) Agreement was signed by the Victorian Government and HVP Plantations. The agreement will return 8,000 hectares to public management and, ultimately, protection as part of the reserve system. An area of 1,500 hectares of plantation within the Cores and Links is subject to a once-off harvest by HVP, with those areas progressively regenerated and placed into public reserves and protection over the coming years. An area of the Cores and Links has been leased to HVP Plantations for this once-off harvest and the lease period will end in 2028.

The first handback of 1,200 hectares of land for the new conservation

the new conservation reserve was completed in 2017 and forms part of the land that has been declared the Brataualung Forest Park. Parts of the park are near Gunyah, a little near Wonyip and about 40% bounded by Budgeree Rd and Grand Ridge Rd. The new 2,390

The new 2,390 hectare park protects important areas of

cool temperate rainforest and damp forest. It provides habitat for significant species including Slender Tree-fern, Koala, Powerful Owl and various Burrowing Crayfish. The community has been advocating for the improved protection of forests in the Strzelecki Ranges since the mid-1990s, and reflects what can be achieved by persistent lobbying by local community groups. Currently the focus appears to be on recovery and conservation, with limited information about public access. 

## Max Rudolf Sauppe (Rudi) 28 April 1922 - 2021



Rudi was born as second son to Curt and Anna Sauppe in Hartmannsdorf, Saxon, Germany, on 28 April 1922. As a young child his father became sick, and Rudi was sent to Bavaria to a children's home. After his father had passed away Rudi went back with to mother and brother in Hartmansdorf. Young Rudi was quite a hand full for his mother as she struggled to provide for her sons.

Rudi finished school at 14 to do his bricklayer apprenticeship. In WWII he served in the Navy, though Rudi managed to stay out of direct conflict as much as possible in serving on supply ships. After the war, back home at a Saturday's dance he met the young widow Anni Heintke (Backmann) and they got married on the 11 March 1947.

Due to the difficult political and work situation in the Russian sector of East Germany Rudi went to the West near Hamburg (Glinde) in North Germany, to find work and build a house for his family. His wife Anni and son Christian joined

him in the west just before the border to the east had closed. Here daughter Heidi was born in 1951 before Rudi signed up to be part of the crew to build in Australia the Briquette factory in Morwell. He arrived in Australia, January 1952 with other German workers.


Rudi decided here in Australia is the right place to raise his family and arranged for Anni and the children to join him in Australia. Rudi bought some bush land in Boolarra to settle with his family. He had some partners on the farm and was able to pay them out after selling part of the original farm to make what is today known as Sauppe farm. Only one week before Anni arrived with the children he received the letter from Anni informing him of when they were arriving. So Rudi with the help of some friends build the first house on the farm in a few days, to have a home for his family as he was still living in the workers camp in Morwell. In 1956 the youngest son Gary was born.

In the following years he cleared most of the farm. They milked cows, sold the cream to the Mirboo North Butter Factory and bred pigs for the market. Rudi worked as a bricklayer at the power stations. Rudi specialized in fire brick works to build kilns in several states in Australia, he also worked as road crew for the shire. Then late in life he worked as carpenter at Loy Yang. Rudi and Anni where involved from the beginning of the German Australian Club Astoria in Morwell where they went to many dances and social events. Sometimes after the dance bringing friends home after the event to roll up the carpet and continue the dance in there Boolarra house. He was active until his health prevented Rudi to participate.

His family remembers the trips to the beach they took as good family times together.

Rudi loved his German shepherd dogs (Tiger and Timba) which he trained at the Morwell dog club and won many obedience prizes with them. There were several tracking dog events held at the farm with participants from the Morwell and Melbourne dog clubs.

He joined the Commonwealth Freemasons Lodge in Mirboo North in 1977. Rudi is remembered for his strong accent, of course, and admired



for his ability to conduct ceremonies in the language. And that Rudi laid a lot of the bricks for the extension that was built in the late 80s. Rudi was Master 1992, he was a mentor to others, and active until his health prevented him to participate in the evening outings.

He enjoyed going out with his boat for fishing trips with his friend Hans and some camping trips with Anni after his retirement. In 1996 Rudi and Anni moved away from his beloved farm in Boolarra to Churchill, as Anni wanted to be closer to shops and healthcare.

With his declining dementia Rudi moved back to the Boolarra Farm in 2015 to be looked after by his son Gary and his family.

Rudi's family, looking back on the 99 years of life that Rudi has lived:

Wife Anni,

Three children Christian, Heidi and Gary, 11 grandchildren,

20 great grandchildren and 5 great great grandchildren with many partners and families.

# **Boolarra Community Development Group**

As I write this article, I am conscious of a substantial paradox in the message I am aiming to get across.

On the one hand the Boolarra Community Development Group (BCDG) has a number of exciting projects and community events in the planning stages.

On the other hand, the BCDG and a number of other institutions within the community are critically short of community volunteer input which could force some organisations and services to go into recess, and management of some facilities to be taken out of the hands of the community.

On the positive side, planning is underway for the development of a number of rose gardens at the entrance to Centenary Park, featuring enhanced signage. Latrobe City has drawn up plans, and we are awaiting the formal specifications so we can begin seeking quotes for the work. This will be largely funded by the Mirboo North and District Community Bank, and the Latrobe City Small Towns Capital Funding. As an offshoot of this, we are also seeking to identify the significant trees within the township, and label them.

The Boolarra Community Development Group welcomes ideas from the community to enhance Boolarra. Recently we have received two great proposals that we are working on.

The first suggestion related to installing historical signage at Railway Park, so that the many visitors who take advantage of its facilities and beauty can also take away some awareness of the story of Boolarra. We're very conscious that Railway Park is in danger of becoming 'cluttered' however we believe that the proposal, of an information panel either side of the rail-trail archway inside the park, and further information panels inside the gazebo, will not only look good but also provide a great historical perspective. We have spoken to the Boolarra Historical Society and they are putting together content (words and photos) for the signs. We are also hoping to put up some signage at the Budgeree Hall.

The second suggestion was to brighten up the township at Christmas by

'lighting up Boolarra'. Again, the suggestion was approved. As a starting point it was decided to concentrate on lighting up Railway Park and a number of buildings adjoining the park. We have written to a number of organisations who manage these building seeking their agreement, the intention being that we will purchase the lights and they will put them up and then store for the following year.

A number of people have asked me recently

when we were planning to have another community garage sale and car boot sale. Our previous one was almost two years ago, so there is quite a bit of demand out there. We discussed it at our last meeting and agreed to look at something around mid-November. Rick Teychenne (Boolarra Folk Festival) and I have had some informal discussions over the past 12 months about staging an informal community post-COVID event, to get people out and about again. Today he sent me an email tentatively proposing something in late-November, and I suggested that this would fit well with the community garage sale, so we will have further discussions and keep you informed. However, all these projects and events take volunteer time and effort. Our last three BCDG meetings have had a maximum of five committee members, and our April meeting was cancelled due to the lack of a quorum. We badly need new blood; especially people who are willing to assist in organising and staging events

such as the Community Garage Sale, Christmas

Carols and Australia Day. We also would welcome someone able to do the administration on the financial grants we arrange on behalf of the community, and someone willing to be the minutes secretary.

None of these jobs are onerous, but without people willing to pitch in then I query whether the BCDG is viable.


But let me be clear; the BCDG is not the only organisation in need of fresh blood and volunteer assistance. The following organisations have all been mentioned to me in the last month as being in urgent need of assistance.

- Boolarra Memorial Hall Volunteer and financial
- Boolarra Multipurpose Building -Committee, and facilities
- Boolarra Link Financial and volunteers
- Boolarra South Landcare Average age of volunteers at last working bee 70+ (Their role includes the upkeep of the Old Mill Site)
- Boolarra Folk Festival Ageing Committee and volunteers
- Boolarra Cemetery Trust Ageing volunteers, and shortage

I apologise if any of these organisations feel I have misrepresented them, as I am only passing on what I have heard in casual conversation.

Boolarra is a great place to live with a beautiful environment and a wealth of facilities and activities available. But it takes sustained community effort to achieve and maintain these things, and we all need to consider how we can contribute.





After a very quiet 2020 it is great to see the reserve getting used to its full capacity again, with cricket, netball, football and equestrian activities resuming.

Every cloud has a silver lining and the bonus for us was that the year off has left the main oval in very good condition, although we do have an ongoing problem with Cape Weed, which is very hard to eradicate.

The Football Club and the Parks Committee have been fortunate in receiving some funding from Latrobe City and AGL to upgrade the lighting of the oval. Anyone who has been down to the social rooms on a Thursday night for a meal and has seen the conditions the players train in will agree that this is a pressing need. Well done Josh Wilson and John Cargill for their persistence in achieving this outcome, which should happen in early June after numerous supplier delays and complications.

The Park has also purchased and installed a new toilet over at the equestrian centre for use on training and event days. This has been something that the equestrian clubs have had as a very high priority for a number of years. Thanks to Dave Grima for hooking the system up, and also for his efforts over a couple of years

in putting aside toilet facilities for a project that didn't quite come to fruition.

Earlier this year Ken Williams passed away. Ken has had a very strong involvement with the park, dating back to the seventies, and since he retired around seven years ago had taken on the role of 'grumpy old man' down at the reserve. Over that time Ken has devoted at least a day per week on mowing, cleaning up, planting and general maintenance of the reserve. The result has been very plain to all Park users as he has really had the reserve in great condition, and he has made ongoing maintenance a lot easier by cleaning up to allow mower access to all areas. If you saw Ken down at the Park while he was working, he was always up for a good chat as well.

When the new equipment shed was built, Ken quickly claimed it as his domain, organising the lighting, shelving and general layout of the shed, and woe betide anyone who stepped out of line. Ken's efforts have been greatly appreciated by the Parks Committee, and by all users of the Park, so in recognition it was decided to name the shed Ken's Shed. Last Saturday a small ceremony was held attended by Ken's family and friends and members of the Parks Committee to unveil the sign.

The Memorial Park has an area of around 30 acres that it leases out. The current lease expires at the end of October and applications for a new three-year lease are invited. See advertisement. Finally, the Committee of Management of

the Boolarra Memorial Park is appointed to three-year terms by the State Minister for the Environment. The current committee's term of office expires in November this year, so we will be inviting applicants for the new committee. Nine people are formally appointed. During the next committee's term of office the reserve will celebrate it's 100th year, so people interested in helping to plan and organise an appropriate celebration would be very welcome, either as part of the formal committee, or on an event sub-committee.

## Russell Northe MLA Member of Morwell

On 20 May the Victorian State Government handed down its budget for the 2021/2022 financial year. It has been interesting to observe State Governments around Australia and the Federal Government deliver their budgets in the midst of a global pandemic. Unfortunately the debt levels being reached are quite concerning and here in Victoria our State debt is expected to reach \$156 billion by 2025.

The State Government's big ticket item was the investment in mental health services which comes on the back of Royal Commission into Mental Health in Victoria. This inquiry clearly showed the system is broken and to the Governments credit they have recognised this. The reality is we have to get to the point where people and families are able to access mental health services in their local community and when they need it.

In terms of Budget outcomes from a local perspective, the State Government has committed \$10 million for the Morwell Food Manufacturing Precinct which is located next to the Bega Cheese yogurt processing plant on Princes Way. The works include upgrades such as the connection of power, water and sewage along with building better access to the site to

help facilitate the movement of heavy vehicles and manufacturing equipment. When complete the site will accommodate up to 44 prime industrial lots and reinforce Gippsland as a food and fibre stronghold.

In my budget reply I highlighted the importance of ensuring that local people have the opportunity to participate in not only the construction phase of any State Government works in our region but ongoing employment opportunities as well. Hopefully that will be the case. As with any Budget there were a number of initiatives that I had hoped would be supported by the Government but unfortunately they missed out. For example, we now know that Yallourn Power Station is set for closure in 2028 and the native timber industry is also set to shut in 2030 and the potential loss of jobs are real and come on top of the previous closure of Hazelwood Power Station and Carter Holt Harvey timber mill in Morwell, yet there is still no plan or transition plan for the Latrobe Valley to indicate what industries and jobs will fill the void that will be left with these closures. I was disappointed that support was missing for upgrades to the Latrobe City Sports & Entertainment Centre which could play a host role for the 2023 FIFA Women's World Cup if the facilities were redeveloped to meet modern standards. Other projects such as the Lake Narracan housing development precinct, a Latrobe Valley Drug Court and a hospice and improved palliative care services were

overlooked in the 2021/2022 Budget which was disappointing also.

And during May I had the pleasure to call past Boolarra Primary School and say hello to teachers and students from both Boolarra Primary and Yinnar South Primary Schools as they participated in a Do it for Dolly Day which seeks to raise awareness around bullying. The students undertook a range of activities throughout the course of the day and I was very impressed at their level of knowledge and participation. There were many highlights but for me it was the commitment from the children as to how they could take individual actions that could stop bullying from occurring in the first place. Thank you to Principal Sue, teachers and students for their hospitality on the day.



#### Your winter fire plan

As we move into the chilly winter months and stoke our wood fires up, it is timely to remind residents check that their chimney flues are clean and the fireboxes and bricks are in good condition. Check and test your smoke detectors to make sure they are working properly.

Consider your fire plan in the event you have a house fire. Do you have a plan? What are your exit points? Where is your agreed safe place to



gather in the event you have to evacuate? Does everyone in your family know what to do? It is always good to have a plan that everyone in your home knows so take some time over dinner one night and prepare.

#### **Brigade responses**

Whilst the Brigade has had less incident callouts, we have responded to a number of structure fires and motor vehicle accidents over the past few months, working with neighbouring brigades to manage these. #### **Brigade Training**

Training continues every second Monday night with a good number of members attending. We have a number of new members who are currently developing their firefighting skills and doing a fantastic job. They will be excellent additions

to our volunteer ranks. We recently hosted 10 members from Morwell Fire Brigade and two from Churchill, engaging in a joint training exercise that involved a simulated MVA (motor vehicle accident) where qualified crew members donned BA (breathing apparatus) to perform skills maintenance. The exercise involved map

reading, communications, simulated containment and extinguishment of a car fire and bushland, location and management of casualties and draughting water from a dam. Churchill CAFS (compressed air foam system) tanker also attended, allowing all present to refresh their skills on this specialist appliance. We will continue to engage in shared training with neighbouring brigades over



the winter months.

#### **Juniors**

After the interrupted year last year due to COVID-19, our junior Brigade is running again with nine members. They meet on the alternate Monday night to senior training and are thoroughly enjoying being back. The focus is on developing teamwork and leadership amongst our juniors, using modified firefighting exercises and drills. They also practise map reading and radio communication skills.

As always, the members of the Boolarra Fire Brigade appreciate the support of the Boolarra community. New members are always welcome at the Brigade and there are a number of roles that individuals can play within the organization, both operational and non-operational. ## **COVID-19 Checking in with QR Codes**

Checking in at venues and facilities helps with contact tracing and keeps Victoria safe and open.

Why do I need to check-in?

When you check-in, you create a record of the time and date you visited a venue.

This means that if there is a COVID-19 outbreak, contact tracers can quickly access your contact information and get in touch with you, if you've visited a public exposure site.

Where do I need to check-in?

Venues must use the free Victorian Government QR Code Service for record keeping.

Venues must make reasonable efforts to provide an iPad or other device for people who do not have access to a device, or use alternative record keeping system (such as pen and paper) when it is not practicable for a person to record their attendance using QR codes or where there is a technical access issue for QR codes.

What if I'm only dropping off or picking up from a venue?

Current Chief Health Office directions require that anyone attending one of the Venues or facilities must check in, regardless of how long you spend at the venue.

This applies to everyone, whether you are an employee, customer or other visitor attending the venue on work duties.

It also applies to:

delivery drivers doing pick-ups from venues. customers picking up items via 'click and collect'. If in doubt, just check in. It's quick, easy and free – and will help keep your loved ones and the community safe should a COVID-19 outbreak occur.

What information is collected when I check-in? The only details you are required to provide when using the Victorian Government QR Code

Service are your name and phone number. The QR Code Service will automatically record the date, time and location of your visit.

How is my information used?

Your check-in details are only used or shared for contact tracing purposes if there is a suspected or confirmed COVID-19 case at a venue you have visited.

Your personal information can only be used by health authorities to help manage an outbreak of COVID-19.

If there's no outbreak at a venue you've been to, your check-in details will be deleted after 28 days. If your details have been provided to the Victorian Chief Health Officer to help manage an outbreak, they can be held for more than 28 days if that information is needed for contact tracing purposes. Your details won't be used for marketing or any other purposes.

Read more about how your privacy is protected when you check-in online.

Do I need to download anything to check-in? If you have a newer smartphone, you most likely can just use your camera.

If your phone doesn't start the check-in process

automatically, you must download the Service Victoria app.

#### What is a QR code?

A QR code is a link that your smartphone camera can recognise.

In this case, it will activate the check-in for the venue you are visiting.

What if I don't want to check-in?

If you are attending a venue or facility where record keeping is a requirement, you must check in.

This ensures that in the event of a COVID-19 outbreak, contact tracers can quickly access your contact information and get in touch with you if you've visited a public exposure site.

What penalties apply to businesses that fail to comply?

Authorised Officers will issue an on-the-spot \$1,652 fine and may be prosecuted in court for non-compliance.




mowing at the Mill Site takes up quite a bit of our volunteer time. That means tracks are not getting as much attention as we would like. We had a
