Centenary Celebration time capsule unveiled



The Boolarra Community Development Group has been working a on a project to renew the Centenary signage and de-**BOOLARRA** velop a Rose Garden in Centenary Park.

With the framework for the Rose Garden completed by Strzelecki Engineering, Michael Cleaver arranged for Laurie Zeibell to assist him with the installation of the framework, and the movement of the Centenary Rock into the new garden bed. They were somewhat surprised when moving the rock to come across a time capsule that had obviously been buried there as part of the celebrations in 1984. Fortunately, the capsule was not damaged.

Enquiries were made with the Historical Society, who advised that the Centenary Celebration committee, including Michael Gleeson, Bluey Hibbins, Judy Webster and Ann and Paddy Morgan had prepared the time capsule. The intention was that it would be re-opened in fifty years, or 2034.

After discussions with the members of that group, it was decided that the best course of action would be to re-bury the capsule. It was also proposed that a new capsule be prepared, to be opened fifty years from now, or 2074.

The Development Group has prepared some material to go into the new capsule, including a copy of the Link and input from the Folk Festival and the Footy Club.

However, if anyone has any other items or material they think would be suitable for inclusion in the capsule, please contact Michael Cleaver or myself, bearing in mind that the items need to be able to fit inside a length of 100 or 150 mm PVC

The two time capsules will be buried in early October. Michael has sourced some old railway sleepers with a local connection to be included in the Rose Garden, and the intention is to have a plaque with some of this story, and instructions for recovery of the time capsules at the back of the Rose Garden.

One of our group Peter Devonshire has recently retired as Chair of the Board of Latrobe Landcare Network. He was a member of the Board for 10 years. Peter oversaw the change of the Network to WGCMA and more recently to Latrobe City Council. The Board thanked Peter for his contribution over all that time.

The Department of Energy, Environment and Climate Action (DEECA) is developing a new waterway management strategy strategy to guide how our waterways are managed. We are interested in restoring fish habitat in the Morwell River. Floods and subsequent erosion has seriously affected the fish populations in our river and we are interested in having a survey of the fish populations and seeing what can be done to restore them.

Some of our farmers have problems with deer and have to build very high fences to try to keep them off their farms. If you are adversely impacted by deer there is a Victorian Deer Contol Program identifying priority areas to minimise the impact of deer. It also aims to increase awareness, understanding and capacity to manage deer. More information can be found on the DEECA website.

Landcare is encouraging participation in a campaign 'Let's put the great back into the great outdoors'. The campaign is a great spring clean of our

Boolarra and District Historical

As Boolarra moves on towards its 140th year, and not far from the 150th, it seemed a happy coincidence that the capsule, buried at the 1984 centenary celebrations was found in good condition as a removal of the large centenary rock to a new rose garden revealed recently. It will be replaced under the rock unopened, probably, till the 150th anniversary year. Thanks to the workers who made this important discovery. It brings back memories of a wonderful weekend in 1984.

Museum open days on the first Sunday of each month have flourished this year. Our collection of maps of the district has occupied visitors searching for property titles. Photographs of the town, early families and school pupils are very popular and one of our members is constructing a 3D model of the town and the railway as it was early last century using these maps and photographs. Speakers at our meetings these last few months have included Patrick Morgan who has just published a history of the Gippsland Catholic Diocese called 'A

Mass Kit in the Saddlebag'. which follows the gradual establishment of the Catholic Church in this region from its beginnings in the 1840's to the 1970's this century. We also learnt from Marion Keogh of Yinnar of her childhood at a Molesworth Green farmhouse at Boolarra South. This farm originally belonged to the Earl family, the first settlers in that district. One of our members, Ivan Haustofer, is researching the life and farming projects that Molesworth Greene established in this district, so we are grateful for any information. We held our AGM dinner this August and with a large group of members present it was unanimously agreed that our present committee members be kept in place: president: Edgar Owen, secretary; Denise Schiller, vice-president; Linda Minter, secretary; Tony Minter, treasurer. We thank them for their service to the society and to our community.

Boolarra and District Historical Society meets at 2pm at the Boolarra Historical Museum on the third Tuesday of each month. New members are always welcome, and information about our activities can be obtained from President Edgar Owen (5169 1566), Secretary Linda Minter (0447 996 702) and treasurer Tony Minter (0427 101 253). The Museum opens on the first Sunday of each month from 2-4pm or by appointment with the above members.



BURNING ISSUES BOOLARRA CFA NEWS

September 2023

Start Summer Preparation and Planning NOW!

The first hints of spring weather are starting to show and, as always, our thoughts are turning to planning and preparation for the coming summer fire season. We are beginning our mandatory pre-season training drills and making sure our appliances, equipment and skillsets are ready for what is looking to be a warmer and drier summer with an associated fire danger risk.

Advice from CFA D27 HQ is that the 2023-2024 fire season is coming early and the development of the El Nino weather pattern means the potential is for it to be quite busy. Current climate outlooks predict that spring will be warmer and drier than normal and we know that both Queensland and NSW fire services are indicating that their fire seasons are about 6 – 8 weeks ahead of normal.

What does this mean for you? It is time to review your bushfire planning and start preparing your property for summer. Understanding the Australian Fire Danger Rating system will help you with your planning and preparation. Go to https://www.cfa.vic.gov.au/warnings-restrictions/total-fire-bans-fire-danger-ratings/about-fire-danger-ratings for information. The AFDR is displayed on the signs at the corner of Monash Way and Bastin Street, and at the Post Office, and is changed every time the rating changes. We also post this information on our Facebook page (www.Facebook.com/BoolarraCFA). Follow us to keep an eye on what is going on with your local fire brigade.

Planning

What are your plans if our community is facing the impact of fire? Who do you need to include in your plan? Will you stay or leave? Where will you go? What will you need to take with you? Thinking about these questions before the fire season means that you can create a plan that keeps you and your loved ones safe in the event of a bushfire emergency in our community. Surveys show that many Victorians do not have a bushfire plan and will wait until they see smoke or flames or wait for an emergency warning before they act. In many cases this means it is too late to leave. Each of us need to take some responsibility for keeping ourselves safe and having a plan is one way you can do this. When you have a plan, make sure that all members of your home know what the plan is. Prepare your property

There are a lot of things you can do now to prepare your property for the summer fire season. Clear fine fuels such as leaf litter, twigs and bark from around buildings and fences. Check and clean your gutters on a regular basis. Prune back trees and shrubs near your house and keep the lawns mowed. Store fuels, firewood and gas bottles away from the

house. If you live on acreage, create a firebreak along your perimeter fencing. Make sure that fire trucks can fit up driveways by trimming trees and bushes – remember a fire truck needs a minimum width of 3.5m and height of 4m to gain access. Make sure your property number is visible and easy to read, including at night.

The CFA website has a range of templates and advice to assist you with planning and preparation for summer www.cfa.vic.gov.au/plan-prepare, or you can drop into the fire station on Sundays between 9am and 10am to have a chat and collect information that will help you.




Community Information Sessions

The Brigade will be running two Community Information sessions in identified high risk areas of our community on Saturday 23 September. At 10am, we will have an information van at the intersection of Todd's Road and Darlimurla Road to chat with any residents who live to the northwest of Boolarra township (Darlimurla Road, Todd's Road, Bunderra Drive and Macintosh's Road area). From 1pm on the same day, we will have the information van at the old Scout Hall site on the corner of Bastin and Young Streets, targeting residents on the southern edge of the town abutting the Old Mill Site (Foster Road, Bastin Street, Young Street area). Advice and information specific to these areas will be provided to residents to assist them in planning and preparing for summer, but all interested community members are most welcome to come along.

Brigade Training

Brigade members continue to train each fortnight using all the appliances located at our stations to develop and maintain our skills. We often have members from Yinnar South join us as well. We are focusing our training on the Chief Officer's mandated skillsets – crew protection and Hazardous Tree awareness, as well as grass and bush firefighting, draughting from static water supplies, navigation and communication. We are



also refreshing our crew leadership and incident management skills and supporting newer members to develop these skillsets. We continue to take part in Group Training exercises, recently hosting several brigades at a session at the Boolarra Football Ground.

Firefighting Water Tanks installed

Recently, Latrobe City Councill supported the installation of three 20,000 litre water tanks at strategic locations to support firefighting efforts. One of these is located on Budgeree Road, and the other two are in Yinnar South at Peel Drive and the intersection of Whitelaw's Track and Explorer's Road. Members from Boolarra, Yallourn North and Yinnar South ferried water to fill these as they were installed so that we have water sources in the event of a fire.

Give us a Hand – join our Brigade

Our Brigade is always on the lookout for new members and there are many roles that people can fill. We always need operational firefighters - especially people who can turn out during the day but there are also a number of support roles that can utilise the skillsets that people in our community have. If you are new to Boolarra, it is a great way to meet community minded people and get to know the local area. If you have some spare time, volunteering with CFA is a way you can fill that. We understand that volunteers give what they can, when they can, and our brigade is friendly, welcoming and inclusive. We provide a supportive space to learn new skills and we manage to have a quite a bit of fun along the way. Please pop in at the station any Sunday between 9 and 10 am and have a chat to us about how

Grafting repair exercise at Yinnar Community Garden

I visited the Yinnar Community Garden on a clear and sunny but very cold 16 August - with the gracious permission of Sari and Catheryn - to carry out a grafting repair to a damaged persimmon tree that had been accidentally reversed over by a vehicle some time ago.

The persimmon tree grafting pieces or 'scions' as they are properly called, I sourced from the original two-acre 1880's 'John and Martha Webster' heritage orchard here at 'Royston'. This was described by my late grandfather, who knew the Websters, as "...the best garden and orchard ever seen at Budgeree." The grafting scions are from a very large, spreading tree around eight metres high. In late summer/early autumn it bears heavily with medium sized, rounded to heart-shaped orange fruit - that when fully ripe, have a lovely pulpy flesh not unlike a mango in taste and appearance. It is of the non-astringent varieties of persimmon.

I learned to do grafting online through watching YouTube videos. It's a skill anyone can probably learn - but be prepared to fail repeatedly, before you eventually succeed.

Good luck to the Garden, and the continuation of rare heritage fruits, with this timely and handy 'persimmon repair' exercise!



Aniseed Myrtle

One of the more unusual trees we have growing at the Yinnar Community Garden is the Anise or Aniseed Myrtle (Syzygium Anisatum). Native to NSW, it is a rainforest tree which is rare in the wild. It can grow as tall as 45m in its natural habitat, but only to 10m when cultivated, and it can be kept clipped to 2-3m. I was first introduced to this plant at Peppermint Ridge in Tynong North, where our tour group was offered the delicate reddish baby leaves to nibble on. As promised, they tasted just like licorice lollies! According to warndu.com, Indigenous Australians tra-

ditionally use Aniseed Myrtle to flavour food and to make a revitalising beverage. It was used medicinally as a tonic which had a vitalising effect. Aniseed Myrtle also has anti-fungal and anti-microbial properties and is used in the cosmetic industry. Interestingly it is very high in lutein, which studies show can help slow down age-related eyesight deterioration. It is also a good source of folate, vitamin E and vitamin C. A number of retailers sell dried and ground Aniseed Myrtle leaf for over \$100 per kg, but why not grow your own? It makes an attractive ornamental tree with wavy green leaves and can be harvested all year round. Aniseed Myrtles are sensitive to frost and need to be kept well-watered while establishing. As we are susceptible to frosts at the YCG, we have been protecting our tree with shade cloth during Winter. Although not as popular yet as Lemon Myrtle, Aniseed Myrtle is a fragrant and delicious native Australian food plant which is well worth considering for your garden. To taste it for yourself, come along to one of the YCG working bees on Wednesday or Saturday mornings (wet weather excepted)!

New 12 Seat Community Bus



Locals in Boolarra, Yinnar, Mirboo North and the surrounding area will have better access to transport thanks to funding from the Department of Transport and Planning (DTP) for a new community bus.

The Community Foundation was successful in applying for \$56,800 of funding from the Department of Transport's Flexible Local Transport Solutions Program (FLTSP) towards a new 12 seat community bus for the Mirboo North & District Community Foundation (Community Foundation). The remainder of the cost has been borne by the Community Foundation and the new bus has arrived and is in operation. The Community Foundation has been operating a community bus in the Mirboo North area in collaboration with the Mirboo North Community Shed for the past seven years. However, the bus itself has been in operation for over 17 years and was nearing the end of its life. The new vehicle will mean that this service can continue to support the local communities in our district, including schools and social groups.

Lack of access to transport is a key issue for our district, given its location halfway between local transport hubs of the Latrobe Valley and coastal South Gippsland. The Vital Signs Reports, which the Community Foundation published in 2020 in partnership with the Mirboo North and District Community Bank, identified transport access as an issue for young and old people in Mirboo North and the wider local area.

"We're thrilled to have worked with the Department of Transport and Planning to get a new community bus," says Ruth Rogan, Executive Officer of the Community Foundation. "Their support ensures that the people of Boolarra, Yinnar, Mirboo North and beyond will continue to have access to a community bus, a crucial transport option in our rural area."

The FLTSP provides funding to local governments and community organisations for small-scale transport projects, evidence-based transport studies, and funding to redesign and trial new ways in which transport services at a local level can be delivered across Victoria.



Boolarra Folk Festival Celebrates Twenty Years This year the Boolarra Folk Festival celebrated its 20th Anniversary. Over 9,000 people enjoyed the fantastic line up of performers and the enticing food and market stalls.

To mark this milestone the Boolarra Folk Festival Life Membership Event was held at the Old Boolarra Pub to acknowledge those who have contributed so much of their time and energy to the Festival. To maintain and manage an ongoing, annual, and free community event requires considerable coordination and cooperation. It would not be possible without the generosity and skills of community members.

During the afternoon we heard from Rick Teychenne and Grant McNeill who shared their memories and the achievements of the Boolarra Folk Festival. About 800 musicians have played on the main stage, the Memorial Hall and ARC Yinnar over the last 20 years. The market and food stalls have been a huge part of the success of the Festival with about 100 market stall holders participating each year. Sixty volunteers are needed to setup, manage and bump out the Festival. This means well over 1,000 people have provided their time and effort to be part of the Boolarra Folk Festival.

There is significant community and social benefit from showcasing our town, bringing people together and building our musical reputation as part of the arts corridor in the Latrobe Valley and South Gippsland areas. Over 160,000 people have attended the Festival. We estimate that each year about \$1.2 million is generated by people spending money to travel and stay in the area. Our local service and sporting clubs promote their activities and raise funds during the Festival.

The aim of the Festival is to be a free community event, so we rely on valued grants, sponsorships and publicity to keep the Festival going. The Latrobe City Council have provided funding since the inaugural Festival, and we have been fortunate to receive \$120 000

from them over the last 20 years. The Festival has also been generously sponsored by many other organisations such as FRRR, Engie, ACL, MNCF, Bendigo Bank and local private donors. We promote the Festival through our Facebook site, which has over 4, 500 followers, as well as local ABC, AM and FM radio stations and community publications.

Many great community people have been involved in the planning and running of the Festival with a consistently healthy number of committee members. Over the last 20 years there have been at least 40 committee members who bring varied skills and experience to plan and deliver the Festival. We are so fortunate to have this talent in our town and the Life Membership event was a great way to thank and show appreciation for everyone who has been a major part of our festivals.

For those who may not know: "National NAIDOC Week celebrations are held across Australia to celebrate and recognise the history, culture and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. NAIDOC Week is an opportunity for all Australians to learn about First Nations cultures and histories and participate in celebrations of the oldest, continuous living cultures on earth."

Each year there is a theme and in 2023 it was 'For our Elders' celebrating those trail blazers and community and cultural knowledge holders who have worked tirelessly for their people's betterment.

The Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander flags were raised in Railway Park after Aunty Christine Johnson offered a Welcome to Country and Smoking Ceremony. Many locals lined up to pass through the cleansing smoke while Gunaikurnai woman Hollie Johnson gave a brief but powerful speech about the importance of this year's theme - how vital it is to honour and respect all elders.

Following the public Smoking Ceremony a more intimate one was held at the Boolarra Police Station at the invitation of our local copper, Matt Ryan. He invited Aunty Christine to smoke the Station in what was a highly symbolic and reconciliatory moment - one for which Boolarians can be proud.

Other activities throughout the week included a movie marathon of First Nations films, Kids dance and Art activities, and to top it all off a Masked NAIDOC Ball on the Saturday night in the Boolarra Memorial Hall.

Aunty Angie Chittem gave the Welcome to Country and musicians Monica Jasmine Karo (Gunaikurnai) and Pirritu Brett Lee (Palawa) created a soulful and warm atmosphere with their beautiful playing and singing. Food was provided by the Yinnar Pub and after dinner there was dancing to First Nations music. Most people wore masks and dressed up





Sheep Dog Trials to be held in Boolarra

The Boolarra Memorial Park Committee of Management (The Park) is delighted to announce that The South Gippsland Working Dogs Association will be holding Sheep Dog Trials at the Reserve from 17-19 November.

The committee was approached around two months ago and had an on-site meeting with several representatives from the SGWDA to see if the site was suitable, and if there was any interest in us staging the event in Boolarra. They were very happy with the facilities available at the Reserve, and we made it clear to them that we were fully supportive, and indeed excited, by the

There were a number of issues to be worked through by both sides, and they also looked at other prospective locations. In the end, they chose Boolarra because, as they said, everyone they spoke to and had dealings with in making the arrangements were so excited and supportive of the possibility of having the Trials here. The Memorial Park and the many activities that are undertaken there, are a key community asset and the improvements that have been undertaken there over the past 25 years reflect very highly on the efforts of the local committee of management, and the user groups within the Reserve. The Park consists of 40 acres of land and boasts a range of sporting, recreation and community facilities which are heavily utilised by a variety of user groups and individuals. The cooperative nature in which these facilities are shared, maintained and improved by a range of groups is a credit to the community.

The Park Committee's goal is to maintain and improve the facilities at the Reserve, and to maximize the usage of the Reserve by the Boolarra and broader community. The proposed Sheep

Dog Trials are an exciting new development, which we are hopeful will become an annual event.

There will be 50 plus competitors from throughout Victoria and interstate, and over 300 sheep involved in the Trials, over three days of competition, so it is a significant logistical exercise. Initial set up will be on Thursday 16 November, and then there will be three days of events. Several of the competitors will be

camping at the Reserve for the duration. Since the Park Committee first discussed the Sheep Dog Trial proposal with the SGWSDA, I and other members of the committee have had conversations with a wide range of people both from Boolarra and the broader community, and without exception everyone has expressed excitement at the proposal. We believe this event could become a real attraction for the City of Latrobe as an annual event. We have been working closely with the SGWSDA, and other groups such as the cricket and football club, the Boolarra Community Development Group, and Michael Halliday who agists land at the Reserve, to ensure that this first event is a success.

WE would like to involve as many local groups in the event as possible. We are looking at a gold coin donation for entry to the Reserve, with the proceeds going to the SGWDA. They will be using the Social Rooms and are seeking local groups interested in providing morning teas, lunches, etc. over the three days. Any groups who are interested can contact me.

They are also looking at running a number of novelty events to provide additional entertainment for attendees. We are hoping arrange a visit by the Primary School, so that they can see working dogs in action, and have aspects of the dog training explained to them.

The Boolarra Community Development Group



will be looking to hold a Bush Dance which is intended to complement the Sheep Dog Trials, and provide an activity for the participants, spectators and the local community to attend. It will be held at the Memorial Hall with the very experienced Briagalong Bush Band. They provide very good music, and also a dance caller who instructs the dancers on the positions and steps for each dance. It can be very confusing for the newcomer, but it is great fun for everyone, and has everyone working together in a joyous way. The Bush Dance will be a great way to promote the interaction of the Boolarra community, the competitors and regional attendees at the Sheep Dog Trials. The BCDG is also looking at holding a market on the Sunday, so again anyone interested in having a stall, or a car boot of goodies, contact me. We also hope to arrange for some live music on the Sunday. It will also be the weekend of the Food Swap down at the Railway Park, so should be a busy and exciting day for Boolarra. If anybody has any ideas or is able to assist with

any aspect of the event, again feel free to contact me.



Annual General Meeting – 21 September 2023 Report from the Chair

Thank you all for your attendance this evening. Our Community Development Group's aim is to promote the social, economic and environmental development of Boolarra and district in accordance with the wishes of the community. We see our role being to work with the people and groups within the community to advance and foster the town's wellbeing. We also seek to work closely with Latrobe City Council, State and Federal Members of Parliament and various Government Departments, as well as hosting and promoting various Community events for the enjoyment of all.

The BCDG also acts as an umbrella organisation under which other groups can apply for funding, and in recent years we have assisted the exercise group, the Kindergarten, the Play Group, the Historical Society, the Primary School and the BMX track proposal in their funding applications. We have many willing volunteers in Boolarra, serving in a diversity of Community Groups and Clubs, and many of us wear hats in several different organisations. It is a testament to our community spirit in Boolarra that we have such strong participation in what is a relatively small population.

The BCDG has now been active for 21 years, and we are very proud of what we have achieved in that time. One aspect of this longevity is the ability to renew ourselves by the infusion of new blood with enthusiasm, energy and new ideas. We have been very lucky in the past eighteen months or so to have had such a group come in, and they have had a marked impact on what we have been able to achieve.

We have also implemented a committee structure which shares the workload more evenly and has enabled the committee to operate more effectively. The group is in a healthy financial position and we are actively seeking to utilise these funds for the benefit of the community.

We have previously identified increasing social participation as a key goal for our group, especially after the social disruption of the COVID pandemic. A brief look at the activities that we have been involved in over the past twelve months shows a wide range of activities. As always, we have organised the regular, and ever popular Christmas Carols and Australia Day events. This year we also held the Easter Saturday Community Day, featuring an Easter Egg hunt, free music and Community Garage Sale and surprisingly a few car boot sales.



In May we assisted committee member Donna Mack in the staging of the Do it for Dolly down at the Footy Ground.

Donna did a great job in organising and pulling together a big event, and there was an excellent

turn out. A great community day and fundraiser for a good cause but I think, based on the learnings from this year, Donna may scale down next year's event and concentrate on the areas that worked best.

Another great initiative this year, championed by committee newcomers Donna and Margie Mackay, was the ambitious range of NAIDOC Week activities conducted in the first week in July. Commencing with a welcoming Smoking Ceremony, a market and a short film festival, then followed by a range of daily workshops and closing with a Ball on the Saturday night, it provided a wide diversity experiences and opportunities for participation. There is a dearth of NAIDOC Week activities in the Latrobe Valley region, and it was great to see the involvement of the regional indigenous community. Our hope would that in future years we can increase the buy-in from the local community.

NAIDOC Week was shortly followed by a fundraising Bush Dance to assist the Spud Man family who had their fully stocked shed burnt down. The Briagalong Bush Band presided over proceedings, in what was a very enjoyable evening, albeit without raising as much as we had hoped. Coming up in November we have Sheep Dog Trials being held down at the footy ground over three days from 17 to 19 November. Judging by the amount of interest expressed by everyone I have spoken to about it, there will be quite an attendance, from both locals and regionally. To complement the trials, the Development Group will be staging another Bush Dance on the Saturday night. We may also look at having a market/ car boot sale down at the footy ground on the Sunday. We are hopeful that this will become an annual event, and a real drawcard for Boolarra. In many ways, the biggest new activity we have undertaken is the monthly markets on the first Sunday of each month. Some time ago we were approached by the Memorial Hall committee regarding their financial concerns. After committee discussion on the issue it was decided to trial the monthly markets, starting in March, with funds raised going to the Hall Committee.

Again, Donna Mack has been the stalwart in organising this, and has done a great job in chasing up stall holders and preparing the Hall each month. It a big commitment on the committee, and markets typically take a while to build traction. However, we have been able to contribute around \$2,000 to the Hall and stall holder numbers are increasing.

The Development Group does not act in isola-

tion. We rely on the assistance of many groups and individuals from Boolarra and the wider region. I would especially like to recognise the contribution to our activities that Brodie and Shannon at the PO make, both in distributing information on our behalf, and collecting things for us, as well as the support and assistance they give to many other Boolarra groups and individuals. I would also like to acknowledge the contribution that Latrobe City make, supporting us not only financially through grants such as Australia day and Christmas Festivities, and the Small Town Capital Funding, but also with the attendance of the local Councillor at meetings, and the attendance of a Community Liaison Officer.

Finally, I would like to note the valuable contribution that the Community Bank, Mirboo North and District and the Mirboo North and District Community Foundation make in supporting a wide range of activities and projects within the community. I would also like to thank and acknowledge Traralgon Rotary for their assistance at Australia Day and the Do it for Dolly Day. In closing, I would like to thank the Community Development Group Committee members for their participation and support, again noting the great contribution that the newbies have made. It would seem appropriate at this point to recommend participation in our Boolarra Community Development Group and we welcome visitors and new Committee members to attend our meetings normally held on the third Thursday of the month. Please come along and make yourselves known.

Community members are also invited to raise issues at those meetings by prior notice to the secretary, who will make time on the agenda.


